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# Building Science and the Physics of Building Enclosure Performance: 2nd Volume

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### **Foreword**

THIS COMPILATION OF Selected Technical Papers, STP1635, *Building Science and the Physics of Building Enclosure Performance: 2nd Volume*, contains peer-reviewed papers that were presented at symposiums held April 24, 2022, and June 12, 2022, in Seattle, Washington, USA. The symposiums were sponsored by ASTM International Committee D08 on Roofing and Waterproofing, Committee E06 on Performance of Buildings, and Committee C16 on Thermal Insulation.

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## Overview

The first ASTM International Joint Symposium on Building Science and the Physics of Building Enclosure Performance was held in Washington, DC. It was a two-part symposium that began in October 2018 with Committee E06 on Performance of Buildings and concluded in December of that year with Committee D08 on Roofing and Waterproofing.

Originally conceived as a recurring series that would be hosted by ASTM International in collaboration with similarly aligned standards development and professional interest organizations, the first symposium brought together thought leaders from across North America, the UK, Europe, and Asia to address the challenges that we continue to face with building enclosure and whole building performance.
